

# Lawyers give verdicts in O.J. case

Call it a bus-  
man's holiday.

Some of the  
best trial lawyers  
in Dallas are  
closely watching  
developments in  
the O.J. Simpson  
case.

I posed to four  
of the city's most  
acclaimed defense attorneys the admit-  
tedly premature question of what is the  
likely outcome of the upcoming trial.

Their live-and-unrehearsed respons-  
es:

**Kevin Clancy:** "He'll walk. He'll get  
off with a hung jury or a not guilty. You  
get a strange mix of people out there to  
make up a jury. Think about it: It might  
take three to six months for the trial.

"Here in Texas, it would be over in a  
few weeks. In California, the jury gets to  
know the defendant so well, they'll all be  
friends by the time it's over.

"Where else but California can you  
find people who have nothing to do for  
six months?

"I look for nuts in jury selection. I'm  
serious. I look for the craziest people I  
can get, and in California you wouldn't  
have a hard time finding a nut to put on  
the jury."

"Look at the Rodney King and Regin-  
ald Denney trials: The jury had tapes to  
watch and didn't convict. My God, do  
you believe your eyes or do you believe  
the story you're being told in the court-  
room?"
